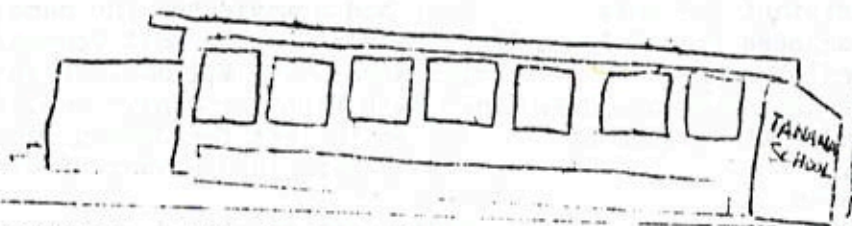

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EDITORIAL

As a young boy Washington did many things that made the history books. He, as you have probably heard, established his honesty in these words, "I cannot tell a lie; I cut down the cherry tree with my little hatchet."

When Washington was 11 his father died. At the age of 16 he got his first job which was as a surveyor with one doubloon or \$15 a day, and sometime six pistoles; (4 pistoles equal one doubloon) George was a good surveyor and knew how to use his tools well. When he was a little over 17 on July 20, 1749, he took the oath as surveyor for Culpeper County. He gained control of Mt. Vernon when he was 20 but was no owner until several years later. When the Revolutionary War broke out he sent 1,000 equipped men to Boston. He led this army and during the war won many victories. When the War was over he was elected to be the first President of the United States. On the night of December 14, 1799 he died of pneumonia.

FISH BARBEQUE

- 3 to 4 lbs. white fish or similar fish
- 2 tablespoons chopped onion
- 1 tablespoon fat
- 1 cup catsup (1 can tomato sauce)
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt and dash of pepper
- 3 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

Place fish in greased shallow pan--sprinkle with salt. Lightly brown in fat--take remaining ingredients. Simmer 5 minutes--pour over fish. Bake in hot oven (425°) 35 to 40 minutes.

FISH BURGERS

| 1 can salmon | Dash of pepper |
| $\frac{1}{2}$ cup canned milk | $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon garlic salt |
| $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon nutmeg | 1 cup corn flakes crumbled |
| $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon salt | |

Drain fish. Remove skin and hard bones. Flake into a bowl and add other ingredients--work with hands to make it a consistency that can be molded into burgers. Brown in hot skillet--a little more or less milk may be used depending on kind of fish. Onion can be added also.

PEANUT BUTTER FUDGE

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup milk
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon salt

Bring to soft ball stage. Put pan in cold water. Beat in 3 heaping tablespoons peanut butter. Beat until stiff. Drop on waxed paper or buttered plate and cut in pieces.

| 2 cups sugar | 2 cups peanuts |
| 1 cup Karo | 2 teaspoons soda |
| $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water | |

Boil all together until nuts pop. Add soda, mix well, and spread as thin as possible in pan. Pull out on edges.
